Marty Cahill called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. and welcomed everyone and led introductions.

**Safety Moment:**

Marty Cahill invited attendees to share a brief safety moment.

- Alicia Bublitz noted they discussed what public meetings should look like and recording those as part of the conversations and how it might be better to note guest or member rather than individual name when discussing sensitive information.

**Meeting Minutes:**

The CCCWN Steering Committee reviewed the minutes from the November 6, 2025, meeting of the Coast to Cascades Community Wellness Network. **Dr. Jeannie Davis moved to approve the minutes as presented, with Bryan Decker seconding. Members unanimously approved the motion.**

**Consent Calendar: Grant Reports:**

**Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Grant Co-Location Project Update:**

Attendees noted the written report attached to the agenda packet for the HRSA Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Grant Co-Location Project.

**HRSA Rural Communities Opioid Response Program – Implementation (RCORP-I) – Helping Impact Women and Youth (HIWAY) Project Grant for Lincoln County:**

Attendees noted the HRSA RCORP-I HIWAY Project Grant written report, Work Plan, Year 3 Progress Report, and Data Supplemental report distributed prior to the meeting and attached to the agenda.

**HRSA Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities (AVIROC) Grant Update:**

Attendees noted the written report and Work Plan Highlights for the HRSA AVIROC grant attached with the agenda packet.

**Dr. Jeannie Davis moved to approve the HRSA Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Grant; the HRSA RCORP-I HIWAY Project Grant with the Work Plan, Year 3 Progress Report, and Data Supplemental Report; and the HRSA Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities Grant and Work Plan Highlights, with Bryan Decker seconding. Members unanimously approved the motion.**

**Community Health Improvement Plan Update (CHIP):**

Amy Young, Program Manager, Partnership for Community Health provided an update on the Improvement Plan update.

- Working on initiatives that align with the CHIP.
- The Benton County Crisis Center is scheduled to open in July.
- Working with partners on coordinating housing and sharing data at Milestones.
- Will be restarting the work group around community engagement. Identifying other work group meetings and existing groups with the CHIP implementation.
- Focusing on the priority areas identified for the Regional Community Health Improvement Plan:
  - a. Access to affordable housing and homelessness
  - b. Access to quality care
  - c. Behavioral Health
  - d. Inclusion, Diversity, Anti-Racism, and Equity (IDARE)
- Presented to the Benton County Commissioners at the end of April. Gave a comprehensive CHIP update.

**Strategic Plan Update:**

Shelagh Baird reported on the Strategic Plan.

- We developed the framework for the CCCWN Strategic Plan.

- Brandan Kearney, Consultant, put together the “draft.” We also look to align the CHIP priorities with the CCCWN priorities, which we see often overlaps.
- The CCCWN’s initial strategic planning meeting emphasized four primary focus areas:
  - a. Workforce Development
  - b. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion
  - c. Mental Health and Behavioral Health
  - d. Substance Use Disorder

### **Grant Funding:**

Shelagh Baird led discussions around grant funding.

- There is a lot of uncertainty right now with our federal grant funding. We are seeing a 26-30% cutting coming to HRSA.
- **Mary Landis** – Next week will be meeting with the professional grant writer to see what grants are out there. We currently are waiting to hear if we will receive two new HRSA grants. We will hear on these grants in July and August. We are looking at state opportunities as well.
- **Amy Young** – This has come up with the Partnership for Community Health. They have expressed interest in connecting on non-government grants. If they can be a partner, keep them in mind.

### **Coalition Updates:**

Provided Coalition updates.

### **Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health Update:**

Dr. Jeannie Davis provided a Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health update.

- Working with the AVIROC Grant on the Violence Prevention Summit with a focus on youth. This year Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health partnered on one summit.
  - a. The date for the Violence Prevention Summit is May 23, 2025, at the Lincoln City Chinook Winds Casino.
  - b. Sommer McLeish noted that we currently have 95 people signed up to attend.
  - c. The event is free, and we will provide food.
  - d. We will have resource tables.
  - e. There will be keynote speaker and three different sessions with speakers, followed by a panel discussion.
  - f. Dr. Lesley Ogden will provide the welcome.

### **Benton, Lincoln, Linn Regional Oral Health Coalition of Oregon (Regional Oral Health Coalition) Update:**

Shelagh Baird provided a Benton, Lincoln, Linn Regional Oral Health Coalition of Oregon update.

- The HRSA Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Grant Co-Location project has ended, but we did get a No-Cost Extension that extends the grant until the end of August.
  - a. The Coalition has been discussing sustainability and how we can recreate or build in a similar program in our region with an Expanded Practice Dental Hygienist or dental provider into our hospital setting. We will also explore how to bill in these types of settings.

### **Regional Mental Health/Substance Use Disorder Coalition Update:**

Heidi May-Stoulil provided a report on the Regional Mental Health/Substance Use Disorder Coalition.

- She has become the recent Chair of the Coalition.
- There continues to be good attendance at monthly meetings.
- Met with different people to see how we can boost engagement. May also shorten the meeting to one hour and share a survey for participants to fill out to make future meetings more engaging and meaningful.
- The Coalition reviews grants, discusses overdose data, discussed activities around the Measure 110 – Behavioral Health Resource Networks for Linn, Benton, and Lincoln Counties, and any other topics of interest.
- **Jolynn Meza Wynkoop** – We will be having Community Conversations the week of May 19-22, 2025. These are stigma reduction workshops with Tedra Cobb, Facilitator. These workshops will be in Albany, Lebanon, Lincoln City, and Newport. The workshops are three hours in length and there will also be a couple of facilitator leader trainings following a couple of the workshops.

### **Media Moments – AVIROC and Recovery City:**

Sommer McLeish shared about the media campaign for the HRSA Addressing Violence in Rural Communities Grant.

- Doing local marketing through billboards with one in Lebanon and one in Gleneden Beach, videos, ads, social media, and other outlets as well.
- Shared the Partner Toolkit, which we will add to the CCCWN website for anyone to download. It has four videos and five different information images. Shared the four videos along with the stand-alone images and slates. These should be available within the next few weeks.
- **Ryan Vogt** – Will the videos be in Spanish?
- **Sommer McLeish** – “No,” but we hope to expand for next year and have in Spanish.

Jolynn Meza Wynkoop shared about Recovery City.

- Last September, we worked with Twin Seas Media to bring in the screening of a documentary, “Inheritance.” The documentary followed a young boy and his family that experienced substance use disorder.
- Representatives from Twin Seas Media reached out to us again this year to see if we would be interested in another documentary called, “Recovery City” that follows the lives of four women in their recovery process. We agreed to bring the documentary to our counties and will be showing the documentary toward the end of June 2025. We will be flying out the filmmaker and one of the main film participants. We will be showing the film in Albany, Lebanon, and Lincoln City. The HRSA HIWAY Grant and the Linn County Behavioral Health Resource Network (BHRN) will be funding the events.
- There will be two additional events – Celebrate Women in Recovery Events for women in all stages of recovery on June 23, 2025, and June 27, 2025. They will show the “Recovery City” film, provide dinner, dessert and a craft activity to help with community building, specific to women in recovery.
- Shared the trailer for the Recovery city film.

### **Updated Charter:**

Shelagh Baird led discussions around the CCCWN Charter.

- In November 2024 we revisited the Charter. The CCCWN revised the Charter in 2015 and 2024. Latest revisions included:
  - a. Changed the title of document and Article 1-Name - Section 1 - “The Coast to Cascades Community Wellness Network.”
  - b. Article IV-Membership – Section 1 – Changed to read – “Members shall include key leaders and executives that have an interest in issues related to the overall health and wellbeing of all people in Benton, Lincoln, and Linn County areas.”
  - c. Article IV-Membership – Added Section 3 – “Members or an appropriate delegate shall actively participate in biannual CCCWN meetings.”
  - d. Article VIII-Staffing – Section 1 – Changed department to read, “Staffing of the CCCWN will be provided by Samaritan Health Services Grants and Sponsored Programs Department.”
  - e. Article VIII-Staffing – Added Section 3 – “Staff shall maintain communications with members and other local organizations and agencies and shall maintain and update the CCCWN website as necessary.”
  - f. Article IX-Roles & Responsibilities – Changed/reworded Section 2 – “The CCCWN Steering Committee will review and approve consortium grant applications; full network members will be given opportunity to review and respond within two weeks of receipt of documents.”

**Dr. Jeannie Davis moved to approve the revised CCCWN Charter as presented, with Dr. Lesley Ogden seconding. Members unanimously approved the CCCWN Charter.**

**Measure 110 Behavioral Health Resource Network (BHRN) Updates:**

Provided Measure 110 BHRN updates.

- **Thien Nguyen – Linn County – BHRN:**
  - a. Partners are solidifying negotiations and budgets for the next round of funding.
  - b. Emergence is launching its Connections Co-dependence Group. This program is for substance use disorder clients, as well as Reflections Clients. Emergence Women’s Trauma informed program (Reflections) continues to see high attendance and consistent progress among clients.
  - c. Family Tree Relief Nursery’s peer support training program continues to see high attendance, with upcoming classes at capacity.
  - d. As noted earlier by Jolynn Meza Wynkoop, Samaritan Health Services is hosting “Community Conversations,” which are stigma reduction workshops. There will be two workshops in Linn County on May 21, 2025, at Boulder Falls Inn in Lebanon, and on May 22, 2025, and at the C.H.A.N.C.E. Recovery’s Albany office. The workshops run from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m., with the Lebanon session having an optional trainer certification workshop from 1:00 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. Attached a flyer to the agenda packet.
  - e. There will also be “Community Conversation” workshops at the Oregon Coast Community College in Newport on May 19, 2025, from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. and then an optional trainer certification workshop from 1:00 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. Then another workshop on May 20, 2025, from 10:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. at the Lincoln City Community Center.

**Survey – Community Engagement:**

Shelagh Baird led discussions around community engagement.

- How can we make our meetings more meaningful and impactful?

- We are re-evaluating how we use our time and aim to share valuable, actionable information. We welcome any input or suggestions from this network.
- We are also exploring ways this group can align and collaborate with the CHIP and our Strategic Plan. One potential area of focus is workforce development.
- **Jolynn Meza Wynkoop** – We have the “consent calendar” on our agenda packet with review and approval of our grant reports. Are you wanting more verbal information with a couple of slides of what we have been up to the last six months, or do you prefer like we are doing with a written report and a presentation?
- **Marty Cahill** – *Does like the “consent calendar” on the agenda packet. Also, likes the idea of a couple of slides that highlight what you are focusing on occasionally.*
- **Shelagh Baird** – If anyone else in the Network is interested in sharing, we would welcome this and *can add “other member updates” on the agenda.* Likes the idea of learning what others are doing. *Will follow up with others not present.*

**Additional Business/Announcements:**

**(Land Acknowledgement and Staffing Updates)**

- **Sommer McLeish** – Have discussed with staff developing a land acknowledgement that we can share at different events. It may be helpful to reflect and ask questions such as why this acknowledgement is happening; does the acknowledgement relate to the event or work we are doing; what is the history of this territory; what are the impacts of colonialism here; what is our relationship to the territory; how did we come to be here; and what intentions do we have to disrupt and dismantle colonialism beyond this territory acknowledgement? If anyone has any ideas, feel free to let us know.
- **Shelagh Baird** – Will be leaving as Network Director. Will plan to work until October if needed. They will post her job description soon.
- **Marty Cahill** – Will be stepping down as chair for the CCCWN and CCCWN Steering Committee. Looking for anyone that may be interested in Chairing and welcomes nominations from other CCCWN members.
- **Dr. Jeannie Davis** - The medical students had their first Equity Health Fair and there were approximately 60 people that attended. They did 10 sport physicals.

CCCWN Meeting Update –

COAST TO CASCADES COMMUNITY WELLNESS NETWORK

*Samaritan Lebanon Communities Hospital requested \$1,200,000 to implement the Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities (AVIROC) project to expand the capacity to improve health outcomes around child abuse, domestic violence, and human trafficking. Through AVIROC, CCCWN/PFH will develop a coordinated approach to addressing these issues by 1) Conducting outreach/education with staff, providers, and the public; 2) Expanding survivor services into our rural and underserved communities.*

*Project funding was awarded and began July 1, 2023. The funding was granted for four years and will last till June 30, 2027.*

*Partners on the project include Samaritan Lebanon Communities Hospital (SLCH), Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital (SPCH), ABC House (ABCH), Acosta Services (AS), Center Against Rape and Domestic Violence (CARDV), Linn-Benton Anti-Trafficking Coalition (LBATC), and Sarah's Place (SP).*

### Updates:

- *Acosta Services* has initiated partner connections and planning for the *Community Action Plan* in Lincoln Co.
- *Center Against Rape and Domestic Violence (CARDV)* social media campaign continues, school presentations start back up, and providing resources at tabling events in rural Linn Co
- *ABC House* is looking at trainings to expand their Health Worker workforce.
- Bilingual Media Campaign local advertising is complete; Partner Toolkit is available to utilize and Spanish translation will be updated this year; Marketing Plan due 12/12/25.
- *Carryover* request has been submitted and approved
- *Sarah's Place* will provide professional development and community resources with AVIROC.

Seven community-based and governmental organizations are working together to support individuals actively using substances or diagnosed with substance use disorder in Linn County. Organizations are providing services to individuals in the areas of Peer Support Services, Screenings and Behavioral Health Needs, Low Barrier Substance Use Treatment, Housing Services, Harm Reduction Services and Supported Employment Services. While the target populations are individuals who identify as Black, Latinx, Native American, LGBTQIA2S+, Asian, Pacific Islander, houseless, incarcerated, veterans, and anyone qualifies who has lived with the experience of SUD/ODU.

Partners on the project include Albany Comprehensive Treatment Center (Albany CTC), CHANCE Recovery, Community Services Consortium (CSC), Emergence Addiction Counseling and Education Services of Albany, Faith Hope and Charity (FHC), Family Tree Relief Nursery (FTRN) and Samaritan Treatment and Recovery Services (STARS).
