Welcome:

Marty Cahill called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone.

Safety/Reliability Moment:

Attendees were asked if they would like to share a safety moment.

- It was noted that there was an AI notetaker and there was discussion whether this was allowed or not and this could be a safety/reliability moment.
- It was also noted that Samaritan Health Services may not allow this. It was asked that the notetaker be turned off. *Shelagh Baird will check further on this.*

Meeting Summary:

The February 12, 2025, meeting minutes of the CCCWN Steering Committee were noted. **Wendy Hausotter made a motion and Dr. Jeannie Davis seconded to approve the meeting minutes as presented. The motion was voted upon and was unanimously approved.**

Federal/State Grants Reports:

Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Co-Location Project Grant Report:

A written report for the HRSA Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Co-Location Project Grant was noted and distributed prior to the meeting.

- **Shelagh Baird** – We did receive a No Cost Extension for the grant that will extend the grant to August 31, 2025, and cover core grant activities.
- The final Year 4 Performance Improvement Measurement System (PIMS) Report is due to HRSA on May 31, 2025.

- The Sustainability final report is due to HRSA on July 29, 2025.

HRSA Rural Communities Opioid Response Program – Implementation (RCORP-I) – Helping Impact Women and Youth (HIWAY) Project Grant for Lincoln County:

A HRSA RCORP-I HIWAY Project Grant written report, Work Plan, Year 3 Progress Report, and Data Supplemental report were all noted and distributed prior to the meeting.

HRSA Rural Health Network Development Grant Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities (AVIROC) Project Update:

A written report for the HRSA Rural Health Network Development Grant Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities Project and Work Plan highlights was noted and distributed prior to the meeting.

Jayne Romero made a motion and Amy Young seconded to approve the HRSA Rural Health Care Services Outreach Program Oral Health Co-Location Project Grant written report, HRSA RCORP-I HIWAY Project Grant written report along with the Work Plan, Year 3 Progress Report, and Data Supplemental report, and the HRSA Rural Network Development Grant-AVIROC Grant written report and Work Plan highlights. The motion was voted upon and was unanimously approved.

Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Process Update:

Amy Young and Sara Hartstein provided a CHIP update.

- The Partnership for Community Health of Linn, Benton, and Lincoln counties met in February. One of the biggest outputs is the new website, which is now live – lbpnershipforhealth.org
- The CHIP is solid in implementation, and we are working with partners and the broader network. Doing an inventory and making connections between partners. Sharing resources and biggest impact.
- **Amy Young** - Putting an open invitation out there, let her know if you would like to be part of the group or attend meetings.
- There are four priority areas of focus:
 - a. Access to Quality Care
 - b. Access to Affordable Housing
 - c. Access to Behavioral Health
 - d. Inclusion, Diversity, Anti-Racism, and Equity (IDARE)
- **Jayne Romero** – IDARE – Today talked with an Oregon partner care organization and currently doing audit with Federally Qualified Health Clinic, shared information from HRSA consultant. Executive Orders coming down from the government/administration do not necessarily currently apply – Things are coming.
- **Sara Hartstein** – Talked about Benton County as well. Also, have HRSA audit. Do we take a stand and still do the work – Stay open or close services – Hard to say what language to use? We should have regional conversations about this and need to talk more about things.
- **Jayne Romero** – It would be helpful to have direction from Oregon Health Authority. We are not going to stop the work.
- **Shelagh Baird** – Read an article in the New York Times on words that are discouraged to use in the new administration. *Will share out to the group.*
- **Amy Young** – Have had discussions on response and commitment. We are proceeding to protect partners and looking at the bigger picture.

- The Partnership for Community Health of Linn, Benton, and Lincoln County consists of different partners – InterCommunity Health Network (IHN)-CCO, Samaritan Health Services, United Way of Linn, Benton, & Lincoln Counties, Community Advisory Council, Linn County Health Services, Linn, Benton, Lincoln Health Equity Alliance, Benton County Health Department, Lincoln County Health and Human Services, and Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians.
- On a partnership level, will be resource for the potential public and different sectors.
- Will meet next week and look at future of continuum of care. Are aligning with IHN-CCO with Delivery System Transformation funding and through the Supporting Health for All Through Reinvestment (SHARE) Initiative.

Oregon Youth Development Grant Opportunities:

Shelagh Baird shared about the Oregon Youth Development Grant opportunities.

- There are grants available for Oregon youth development:
 - a. **Reengagement Opportunity Grant** – (Mid-March-early April 2025) – Reconnect youth to high-school level education, provide outreach for reengagement services, deliver education, training, support services to lead to high school completion, and provide reengagement services.
 - b. **Job and Work Readiness Grant** - (Late march-Mid-April 2025) – Support youth development and skill building for work readiness, provide essential employability skills training, increase paid work experiences/apprenticeships/internships and industry recognized credentials, and encourage multi-sector collaboration with ROG grantees.
 - c. **Community Investment Grant** – (Mid to late Spring 2025) – Increase youth engagement and connection to school and community, reduce barriers and support access to services, increase youth participation in safe and welcoming programming and connection to positive role models, support and promote wellbeing of youth.
 - d. **Youth Violence and Gant Reduction Grant** – (To be Determined for Fall 2025) – Expose factors exposing youth to violent and/or criminal activity, direct community outreach and/or intervention services, support re-entry and wrap around supportive services, and support prosocial activities and positive safe spaces.
- If this is something people are interested in, she can forward the Request for Information.
- The Reengagement Opportunity Grant is due soon and the window for applying for the Job and Work Readiness Grant is within the next couple of weeks.
- **Dr. Jeannie Davis** – The Community Investment Grant sounds like a good one for all of us to do together as a Network.
- **Shelagh Baird** – *Can further discuss these grants at the next meeting as well.*

Coalition Updates:

Coalition updates were provided.

Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health:

Dr. Jeannie Davis provided an update for Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health.

- This year’s summit will be May 23, 2025, at Chinook Winds Casino in Lincoln City.
- Thanks to Sommer McLeish who has done a ton of work pulling together this summit.
- We are combining the Linn, Benton, Lincoln Partners for Health Summit with the Violence Prevention Summit and having the one summit with a focus on supporting youth.
- This will be an in-person event with a keynote speaker, workshops, a panel discussion, and resource tables.

- **Sommer McLeish** – Registration is on Eventbrite, and it provides a list of details regarding the summit. Registration is in English and Spanish.
 - a. Chery Csisky from In Our Backyard will be the keynote speaker. In Our Backyard does a huge event during the Super Bowls and works with law enforcement on human trafficking during these events.
 - b. One of the sessions will be Tristin Young from Jackson Street Youth Services who will be discussing supporting Hispanic families and their youth.
 - c. Another session will have representatives from Angel Flight West who help support and fly home human trafficked survivors.
 - d. Another session will have representatives from Ampkwa Advocacy discussing protecting indigenous futures.
 - e. There will also be a panel discussion with speakers from the different sessions and others.

Benton, Lincoln, Linn Regional Oral Health Coalition of Oregon (Regional Oral Health Coalition):

Shelagh Baird provided a Regional Oral Health Coalition update.

- The Regional Oral Health Coalition does meet quarterly and is the Coalition that oversees the HRSA Oral Health Co-Location Project.
- Leah Hitz, Expanded Practice Dental Hygienist, is back to work after a Family Medical Leave and is at the coastal facilities with our HRSA Oral Health Co-Location Project Grant. She is planning outreach events, and she is continuing to see patients at Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital and Samaritan North Lincoln Hospital.

Regional Mental Health/Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Coalition:

No update provided at this time.

Behavioral Health Resource Networks (BHRN) Update:

Committee members reported on the Behavioral Health Resource Networks (BHRN's).

- **Thien Nguyen – Linn County:**
 - a. Shared the change in funding awards and final grant recommendations for the next grant cycle. There are partners who will be seeing a reduction in funding, with some partners up to 50%. There are other partners that will see an increase, but it will be mostly due to being the only provider that has residential treatment/beds or the only provider with a large investment in housing.
 - b. The partners are doing great work.
 - c. Family Tree Relief Nursery's peer support training program was approved by Oregon Health Authority with the first round of training beginning April 7-20, 2025.
 - d. Emergence's Women's Trauma Informed program (Reflections) has seen a recent increase in referrals. Many of their clients have gained access to support services and successfully completed the program. Emergence is also now offering ASAM 1 telehealth services.
- **Sara Hartstein – Benton County:**
 - a. Similar as Linn County and trying to recover from the Oversight and Accountability Council's process for citing awards. Getting close and negotiations need to occur since awards are smaller.
 - b. Benton County Health Department is a new partner offered to join.
 - c. Waiting to hear on final approval of awards.

- **Bryan Decker – Communities Helping All Negotiate Change Effectively (C.H.A.N.C.E.) – Is in all three counties (Linn County, Benton County, and Lincoln County) –** Had a soft deadline to submit a new budget. The deadline was extended.

Member Updates:

Members were asked if they had any updates they would like to provide.

- **Dr. Jeannie Davis** – The medical students will be providing a Health Equity Fair on May 3, 2025, at the River Center in Lebanon. Looking to have a dental van there and will be doing exams and providing other services.

Next Meeting:

Samaritan North Lincoln Hospital requested \$1,000,000 to implement the Helping Impact Women and Youth (HIWAY) project to reduce morbidity and mortality related to substance use disorder and opioid use disorder in Lincoln County, Oregon. Under direction of the HIWAY consortium, we will strengthen and expand SUD/ODU prevention, treatment, and recovery activities throughout Lincoln County.

Project funding was awarded and began September 1, 2022. The funding was granted for three years and will last until August 31, 2025.

Partners on the project include Samaritan North Lincoln Hospital (SNLH), Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital (SPCH), Samaritan Medical Group (SMG), ReConnections Counseling (RC), Samaritan House, Inc. (SH), NW Coastal Housing (NWCH), Lincoln County Health and Human Services (LCHHS), Faith, Hope and Charity, Inc. (FHC), Olalla Center (OC), Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Indians (CTSI), Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO), and Partnership Against Alcohol and Drug Abuse (PAADA).

Updates:

- The sustainability plan deliverable draft was submitted on May 30, 2025. The final copy of the sustainability plan is due in the EHB by July 31, 2025. The PD/DC is currently awaiting feedback on the report from the HRSA project officer and technical expert lead.
- Copies of the biannual progress reports and performance improvement measurement system reports are being formulated and translated by consultant, Brandan Kearney and Luis Acosta with Acosta Services. Formal report copies will be posted to the CCCWN website under the HIWAY grant.
- The HIWAY grant will end August 31, 2025.
- HIWAY grant partners will partner with Lincoln County partners by attending the annual Hands Across the Bridge event in Waldport, OR in September, 2025.

PD/DC, SNLH, CTSI, RCC, FHC, OC, PAADA	Q3, Q7, Q11	In Progress: In February, PAADA advertised on social media on sobriety and refraining from driving while under the influence. These posts were made around the time of the Seafood and Wine festival that took place in Newport, OR. Two posts were made to educate on the health risks of alcohol consumption. In April, PAADA made five social media posts that shared about alcohol health risks, support options, and treatment.
2c. Provide evidenced-based prevention training to coalition youth.	CTSI, OC, PAADA	Q2, Q3, Q5, Q6, Q7, Q9, Q10, Q11	In Progress: On April 21, 2025, PAADA hosted their Spring Youth Leadership Academy for high school students. 28 students attended this academy. Attendance was much lower for this academy compared to others, so a change in schedule for future academies has been proposed. For the 2025-2026 school year, there will be a Fall (October) YLA and a Winter (February) YLA with the Spring (April) being reserved for the Middle School Leader's Summit. This will accommodate high school spring sports and graduation preparation by moving the high school youth leadership academy from the Spring to the Winter. One speaker who attended the YLA included the Siletz Tribal Prevention Education program. They shared information about opportunities to become peer support specialists through Peer Plus Training.
3b. Provide annual CME on stigma and SUD/ODU to providers and the community.	PD/DC, SNLH	Q3, Q7, Q11	In Progress: The PD/DC worked with the University of Rochester – Recovery Center of Excellence to plan two community conversations related to reducing stigma associated with substance use disorders. The community conversations took place on 5/19/2025 (Newport) and 5/20/2025 (Lincoln City). The trainings were available for all community members to join, were free to attend, and included food and refreshments thanks to a partnership with Lincoln County Public Health. On 5/19/2025, following the community conversation in Newport, there was a Facilitator Leader Training (FLT) opportunity to learn about how to lead these types of stigma reduction trainings. The Newport community conversation took place at the Newport Oregon Coast Community College campus from 9AM-12PM with the FLT following from 1-4:30PM. The Lincoln City community conversation took place at the Lincoln City Community Center from 10:30AM-1:30PM. The Newport training had 8 attendees and the Lincoln City training had 21 attendees. The PD/DC has been working with Lincoln County partners to plan to show the new film, Recovery City. Produced by Twin Seas Media, the film follows the lives of women who have substance use disorders and are either considering treatment or are in recovery. The film's filmmaker, Lisa Olivieri, and film participant, Six, will come to Oregon at the end of June (23 rd -27 th) to share the film and host Q&A sessions. The current tentative schedule will include a screening of the film in Newport at a Celebrating Women in Recovery event on June 23 rd at the ReConnections Counseling Annex. This event will include a screening of the film, Q&A, a dinner for attendees, and some sort of group activity/craft. A second screening of the film will show in Lincoln City on June 26 th at the Lincoln City Cultural Center. This will be open to all individuals in the community and will include a Q&A session following the film. The final Lincoln County film screening will be at another Women in Recovery event that will take place on June 27 th at the Lincoln City Cultural Center. This event will again include a screening of the film, Q&A, dinner, and a group activity/craft. Childcare will be offered by Samaritan House at the Celebrating Women in Recovery events. A planning meeting is scheduled for any Lincoln County who would like to attend on June 11th from 1-2pm.
3k. Provide recovery support services including case management, housing, employment, transportation, food, childcare and doula support for pregnant women, women, youth and marginalized community members with SUD/ODU.	RCC, SH, FHC, NWCH, CTSI	Q2-Q12	In Progress: In April, CTSI trained six of their staff to become doula certified. The curriculum was presented by Doula Love out of Portland, OR. Staff roles included a sexual assault/domestic violence advocate, a health navigator/community health worker, a health navigator/death doula/traditional health worker, a certified recovery mentor/community health worker, a harm reduction outreach and education specialist, and a community health worker/community advocate. These staff work in various areas of the Siletz Tribal Health Clinic and will bring their new knowledge and education related to doula services to their current role in order to best serve their clients.

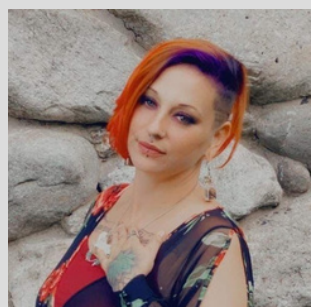

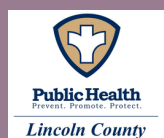

May 2025

Samaritan Lebanon Communities Hospital requested \$1,200,000 to implement the Addressing Violence in Rural Oregon Communities (AVIROC) project to expand the capacity to improve health outcomes around child abuse, domestic violence, and human trafficking. Through AVIROC, CCCWN/PFH will develop a coordinated approach to addressing these issues by 1) Conducting outreach/education with staff, providers, and the public; 2) Expanding survivor services into our rural and underserved communities.

Project funding was awarded and began July 1, 2023. The funding was granted for four years and will last till June 30, 2027.

Partners on the project include Samaritan Lebanon Communities Hospital (SLCH), Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital (SPCH), ABC House (ABCH), Acosta Services (AS), Center Against Rape and Domestic Violence (CARDV), Linn-Benton Anti-Trafficking Coalition (LBATC), and Sarah's Place (SP).

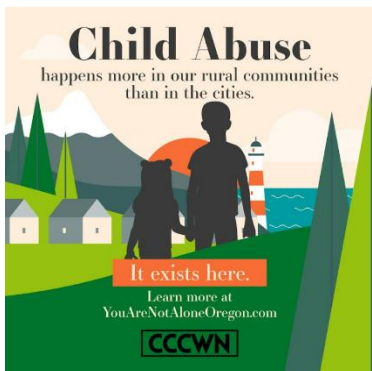

- *Sarah's Place attended conferences/trainings for professional development*

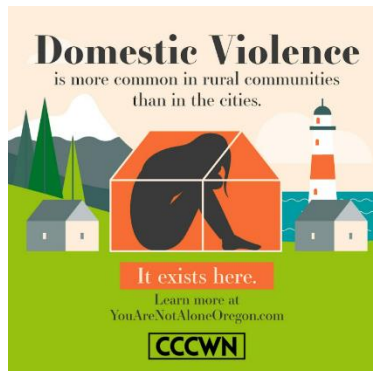

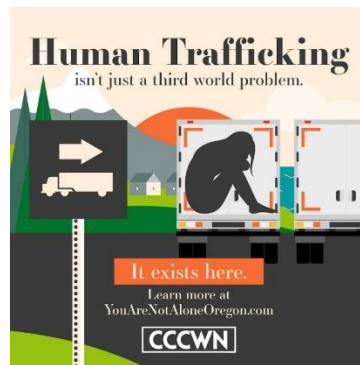
- Convene monthly meetings of CCCWN/PFH to guide activity coordination among organizations and w/in the Network (ongoing)

- Provide counseling for survivors of child abuse at Sweet Home Family Medicine Clinic one day per week (on hold) Community partner ABC House pauses counseling services with AVIROC; working to fill this gap
- Identify ongoing funding opportunities, including eligibility for VOCA and CAMI funding (ongoing)

CCCWN Steering Committee Update – June 2025

Seven community-based and governmental organizations are working together to support individuals actively using substances or diagnosed with substance use disorder in Linn County. Organizations are providing services to individuals in the areas of Peer Support Services, Screenings and Behavioral Health Needs, Low Barrier Substance Use Treatment, Housing Services, Harm Reduction Services and Supported Employment Services. While the target populations are individuals who identify as Black, Latinx, Native American, LGBTQIA2S+, Asian, Pacific Islander, houseless, incarcerated, veterans, and anyone qualifies who has lived with the experience of SUD/OD.

Partners on the project include Albany Comprehensive Treatment Center (Albany CTC), CHANCE Recovery, Community Services Consortium (CSC), Emergence Addiction Counseling and Education Services of Albany, Faith Hope and Charity (FHC), Family Tree Relief Nursery (FTRN) and Samaritan Treatment and Recovery Services (STARS).

Reporting:

- OAC is introducing two new platforms for data collection and reporting: ROADS and Submittable. ROADS will be used for client encounter tracking, and REALD/SOGI demographics. It will not be used until Quarter 2 of the new BHRN cycle. Submittable is where the Expenditure and Narrative reports will be sent. A training session Submittable will be available in July.

BHRN Partner Updates:

- Emergence's Women's Trauma Informed program (Reflections) continues to see high attendance and consistent progress among clients.
- Family Tree Relief Nursery's peer support training program continues to see high attendance, with upcoming classes at capacity. Individuals who wish to be added to the waitlist for upcoming classes may contact Meredith Schrepfer (mschrepfer@familytreern.org).

- In May, the CCCWN hosted a series of SUD stigma reduction workshops called Community Conversations, in partnership with the University of Rochester. These workshops sparked conversation between individuals from various walks of life and were met with positive community feedback.
- This month the CCCWN is hosting a series of free film screenings for the documentary *Recovery City*. In addition to these screenings, the film director and one of the prominent participants will be flown out to participate in Q&A sessions each night.
